Hurricane Preparedness Tips for Your Home & Pets

Your Emergency Kit Should Include:

Food: Three day supply of food for each person and pet in your household.

Bottled Water: One gallon of water per person, per day. Include water for your pets.

First Aid Kit: Make sure to keep it stocked and check expiration dates.

Flashlight, Radio & Extra Batteries: Be sure to take the batteries out until you need to use these items.

Tools: Leatherman, work gloves, dust mask and goggles.

Clothing: Extra pair of clothing in case you need to stay with relatives, neighbors or at a shelter. **Copies**

of Important Papers: License or State ID, lease, SS card, mortgage, pet records.

Medications: Keep a list of everything you, family members or pets take. Include why you take it, what it looks like, and who prescribed it.

Cash: Keep some cash and a roll of quarters for gas, food and phone in case power is down.

Special Items: Items you or a family member personally need. Crates and carriers for your pets if you need to leave your home.

Be Prepared & Be Safe:

If you Need to Evacuate;

- What you do for yourself, do for your pets
- Have a go kit ready with your pets vaccination records, vet info, extra meds, favorite toy, etc.
- Know where your local emergency shelters are set up
- Make a plan with friends or family outside your area to take in you and your pets if you need to evacuate your neighborhood
- Research pet friendly hotels outside your area ahead of time
- Find out if your community has co-located emergency shelters established
- Be sure your pets are chipped and have up to date ID tags
- Never tie up your animal or leave them behind

If you Need to Shelter in Place;

- Plan and prepare your home ahead of time
- Plan for power outages
- Stay in the safest room in your home that has the fewest windows
